

**Illinois Congressional District 11**  
**Congressman Adam Kinzinger**



This report provides key demographic and economic data for Illinois Congressional District 11. It is made available by the Workforce Investment Board of Will County.<sup>1</sup>

**At A Glance**

- The Congressional District’s current **population** of 1,098,275 is expected to increase by 84,970 (8%) over the next ten years.
- By 2016, this Congressional District is projected to create 26,736 **new jobs** with positions in business and financial operations and healthcare practitioners and technicians representing the largest numbers of new jobs.
- Sixteen **employers** in this Congressional District have 1,000 or more employees. These large employers represent seven different industry sectors.
- The Congressional District’s **largest industry sector** of employment is government followed by retail trade and then healthcare and social assistance.
- Educational attainment in the 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District is somewhat lower than the State’s rate. This is especially evident when looking at the residents with some college or higher where the State level is 59.2% but only 56.8% of residents in the 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District have some college or more.


**Population**

- The Congressional District’s current population of 1,098,275 is expected to grow at a much higher rate than the State’s population over the next five and ten years.

- The proportion of the Congressional District’s population that is under 20 years of age and 35 to 49 years of age are slightly higher than the State’s population; all other age groups are the same or slightly lower than the State’s.


<sup>1</sup> With the exception of educational attainment data, all data in this report has been compiled at the zip code level. Consequently, regardless of whether a portion or entire zip code area is included in the congressional district, data for the entire zip code area is reflected in report data.

**Educational Attainment**

- A lower percentage of the Congressional District’s population ages 25 and over have attained a bachelor’s degree or higher (22.7%) than the State attainment rate (30.8%).
- The percent of individuals who have completed some postsecondary education is 56.8% as compared to the State’s rate of 59.2%.

**Industry Sector Employment**

**Between 2006 and 2011**

- The Congressional District gained 13,374 jobs in the past 5 years while the State lost 103,587 jobs overall.
- The industry sectors gaining the most jobs over the past 5 years were healthcare and social assistance (9,075) and finance and insurance (5,450).
- Industry sectors with the largest job loss between 2006 and 2011 were manufacturing (-6,318) and construction (-6,092).



**Looking Forward to 2016**

- Over the next five years the 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District is expected to gain 26,736 jobs, with jobs projected to grow at the same rate as the State. The healthcare and social assistance industry sector is projected to add the largest number of jobs (6,757) followed by finance and insurance (3,399).
- Government is currently the largest industry sector, with 60,721 jobs and average earnings per worker, with benefits, of \$57,765. It is projected that government will continue to be the largest sector of employment through 2016.
- In Congressional District 11, the average earnings per worker, including benefits, is \$46,345 which is considerably lower than the State average of \$55,276.

**Largest Employers**

- The 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District has 16 employers with 1,000 or more employees.
- The largest employers in the Congressional District represent 7 industry sectors with finance and insurance having the most jobs.
- Several very large employers are located in this district representing manufacturing, administrative, and educational service industry sectors.

**Occupations**

**Between 2006 and 2011**


- Over the past 5 years, business and financial operations occupations grew the most adding 3,382 jobs. The second largest growth was healthcare practitioners which added 3,215 jobs.
- Occupational groups with the highest rate of growth were healthcare support occupations (22%) and healthcare practitioners and technical occupations (17%).
- Construction and extraction occupations lost the most jobs (-4,967) followed by production occupations (-3,256).
- The largest occupational group in the Congressional District is sales and related occupations with 59,263 jobs followed by office and administrative support occupations with 58,861 jobs.

**Looking Forward to 2016**

- Over the next 5 years, business and financial operations occupations are expected to have the largest job growth, adding 2,829 jobs. Food preparation and serving related occupations are expected to have the second largest gain with 2,722 additional jobs.
- Legal occupations earn the highest average hourly wage of \$33.72 followed by computer and mathematical science occupations averaging \$32.36 per hour.
- The highest proportional growth is projected for healthcare support occupations with a 15% increase.




**Occupations Poised for Growth in 2016**

- Retail salespersons and cashiers are the two largest occupations in the Congressional District. However, several of the largest occupations are also those that are high skill and high wage occupations, such as truck drivers, registered nurses, and managers.



- In the top ten largest occupations, registered nurses have the highest average hourly earnings of \$28.36 per hour followed by managers (all other) at \$24.27 per hour.



- Personal financial advisors and food preparation and serving workers are the fastest growing occupations in the Congressional District.



**Occupations Requiring Educational Attainment**

- In the 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional District, the largest occupation requiring a post secondary vocational award or higher is registered nurses.
- Three of the top ten occupations requiring an educational attainment beyond high school completion are also among the fastest growing occupations: registered nurses, real estate sales agents, and personal financial advisors.
